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Last year, the outbreak of COVID-19 continued to spread all over the world, affecting seriously our daily life and social activities. Many of our members were very disappointed as most of the local and international Scout activities were forced to postpone or cancel due to the strict social distancing measures. Fortunately, with the integration of information technology, we can continue our Scout activities and training online without physical barriers and make it even more fun and interesting.

Make Good Use of Online Resources

During the pandemic, we encouraged Scout members to make good use of the online resources to keep up their learning momentum as well as to maintain their connections with other brother and sister Scouts. As a kind of support, Programme Branch launched the "Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard" programme and carried out different Scout activities through online platforms such as e-learning, online gathering and assessments. Training Branch also posted different reference materials on Facebook, such as map reading and knotcraft, and simultaneously made an open call to invite frontline leaders to upload their materials on the "Stay-Learning Programme" online platform as well for members' sharing.

At the global level, World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) launched a virtual platform "World Scout Academy" in June 2020. The Academy comprised many different live sessions, learning and exchange opportunities, Scout members all over the world were welcomed to join. This was a very safe platform under coronavirus for members to learn and get connected with each other.

Encourage Continuous Learning

It is always the Association's objective to encourage Scout members to keep on learning and pursuing knowledge and skills amid this difficult time. In order to support youth members to accomplish relevant trainings and assessments, Programme Branch introduced some special arrangements, such as the "Extension of the Assessment Periods of Awards" and "Online Learning and Progressive Award Online Assessment Scheme under the Epidemic", so to minimise the impact to the youth members brought by COVID-19.

Online learning has become increasingly popular. To catch up with the new era, Training Branch not only worked to provide technical support, the team also strived hard to hold the courses virtually and use hybrid teaching as well, in order to facilitate members to continue their training whilst assuring the training quality.

Be Prepared

Throughout the year, face-to-face Scout activities were suspended for most of the time to follow the government's social distancing measures. During the suspension period, the Association made dedicated efforts to get well prepared for the resumption of Scout activities, including but not limited to initiating feasible means to continue training programmes under coronavirus, reviewing existing guidelines and policies as well as working out strategies for future development.

In early 2020, World Scout Bureau announced an updated version of Wood Badge Framework. In light of this, Training Branch took the initiative to set up a task force to review the existing Wood Badge training system in Hong Kong to get aligned with other National Scout Organizations.

To cope with the Triennial Plan, five task forces related to membership growth and retention, Scout image and partnership, uniform, structural review and information & communication technology, were set up in May 2020. The reviews were in progress. Reports and recommendations would be ready later for further discussions and actions.

To support frontline leaders to manage Scout group affairs and administrative works, the Association has been actively sourcing suitable information technology systems and platforms to assist. It is expected that advanced technology could give us a hand, such as timely dissemination of information and launching of virtual training, so that members could always get the first hand information and engage in sharing anytime, anywhere.

2020 was a difficult year. In the face of the pandemic, things do not go on as usual, we have to adopt new means to adapt to all the changes. My heartfelt gratitude to all my brother and sister Scouts and supporters of Scouting. Your unfailing support successfully drives Scouting to moving on. The spirit of "A Scout has courage in all difficulties" is fully demonstrated. Looking ahead, whenever there is a challenge, there is also an opportunity. It is time for us to speed up our works to integrate information technology into Scouting programmes and trainings, to think of more innovative and trendy ones to meet the needs and interest of the Scout members. Let us join hands together for the sustainability of Hong Kong Scouting and make Scouting continue to be a movement for the young people to prepare them to be active citizens of the community.





Headquarters Branches

To cope with the impact of COVID-19 pandemic, Programme Branch launched various measures to keep our youth members engaged. "Online Learning and Progressive Award Online Assessment Scheme under the Epidemic" and "Extension of the Assessment Periods of Awards" had been introduced to enable youth members to continue learning at home and engage in Scout activities and award assessments with alternative arrangements. Also, "Precautions for Expedition Activities under the Epidemic" had been issued so that members could make reference to and take appropriate epidemic prevention measures when participating in expedition activities, training or assessments. Meanwhile, in light of the difficulties faced by all Instructors/ Assessors in fulfilling the renewal requirements, their terms of office had been extended for one more year, so that they could take refresher courses or self-enhancement training to meet the renewal requirements.



Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard

The "Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard" Programme encouraged members to do all kinds of epidemic prevention actions, as well as to make good use of online platforms for continuous Scouting activities and assessments. A total of 62 projects had been recognized, including promoting anti-epidemic and positive caring messages to others through social media, online learning and activities, and face-to-face anti-epidemic community services which could only be joined by adult members. As at March 2021, over 3,700 members participated in various anti-epidemic community services with more than 21,000 beneficiaries while the page view of Health Guard website exceeded 330,000.



Diversity and Inclusion

With the aim of providing equal opportunities for young people from different backgrounds to participate in Scout activities and training, Programme Branch provided information on Scout Sections' websites to give a better understanding and insights to leaders and assessors when handling youth members with special education needs. The assessment criteria for these youth members are flexible for the advantage of their self-development and let them enjoy Scouting.



Multi Development

To further promote the Hong Kong Award for Young People (HKAYP) in the Association, the "HKAYP User Unit Leaders Registration Scheme" was launched to strengthen the management of our user unit leaders. To enhance environmental protection education, the Association and the WWF-Hong Kong signed a Memorandum of Understanding on environmental education. Besides, the Scout Dragon Boat Club of Scout Association of Hong Kong was established to promote and encourage our members to participate in dragon boat activities.



Support Internet Learning

A total of 53 Wood Badge Courses and Leader Skill Courses were held during the year. For the Scoutcraft Accreditation Scheme, one training course, two workshops and six examinations were held. Regarding training for combined staff and trainers, two basic operations courses and four basic trainers courses were organized. To tie in with the "Integrated Arrangement of Scoutcraft Training", one "Campcraft Refresher Workshop" and one "Pioneering Refresher Workshop" were held.

To meet the training needs of leaders at Scout Groups and Sectional levels, Training Branch organized training activities in the areas of mental health, counselling and Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), including the "Special Education Needs in Scouting Workshop", "Scout Mental Care Online Sharing", "Spiritual Development Activities Workshop", "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People Sharing Session", "Nature as Classroom – Workshop on Guided Tour Programme for Leading Scouts to Outdoors", etc.

To meet the online teaching needs of trainers, Training Branch allocated resources to enhance software, hardware and training support. There were 1,615 people participated in the above 75 trainings. In response to the epidemic, 30 trainings were conducted in online or blended learning mode. Blended training mode is a combination of online and face-to-face mode which will become a new trend for Scout training.

Two new leader skill courses started during the second half of 2020, including the Effective Meetings Course and the Time Management Course. A total of 97 leaders were awarded the Wood Badge.



Wood Badge Framework of World Organization of the Scout Movement

We invited the Education University of Hong Kong to review and compare the objectives, aims and content of the new "Wood Badge Framework" of the World Scout Bureau with those of our Wood Badge System, so that our Wood Badge Training System can be implemented in accordance with the needs and feasibility of the framework proposed by the World Organization of the Scout Movement, and our leader training can be more compatible with that of Scout leaders around the world.



World Scout Academy

Training Branch welcomed the launching of World Scout Academy e-learning platform and published weekly briefings during the event from 29 June to 9 August 2020 to encourage active participation of our adult members.

Review of Administrator Wood Badge System and Trainers' Basic Training

With the support of the Regional Training Commissioners and trainers, a review of the course content of Administrator Wood Badge System and Trainers' Basic Training Course Module 1, 2 and 3 had been launched.

"Stay-learning" programme

To meet the training and continuous learning needs of leaders and Scout members during the epidemic, Training Branch continued the Scout Training Programme – "Stay Learning" launched last year. An online learning platform had been actively developed to cover training materials to support continuous online learning for leaders. The programme also encouraged Scout Group Leaders to share self-produced training materials. Since late February 2020, 82 Facebook and Instagram posts, including 44 videos and 32 photos and messages and so on, had been published, with about 321,544 contacts and 1,807 shares.



Online Questionnaire System for Quality Assurance

In order to enhance the efficiency of questionnaire collection and analysis for Leader Training Courses and for the purpose of environmental protection, from September 2020 onwards, Training Branch and all regions had been using an online questionnaire system instead of paper questionnaires to collect participant evaluations and self-evaluations of Wood Badge Courses, Leader Skill Courses and Trainers' Training Courses. In the year under review, we had conducted six training course visits, and completed 53 training course evaluations and 118 in-service training evaluations. The evaluations were well received with positive feedback.

Review of Organizational Structure

In line with the future development of the Association, the first phase of the organizational structure review of Training Branch was completed on 1 June 2020, which was based on the development of an online electronic learning platform and resources, support the enhancement of leader skills, including management skills, counselling skills, special educational needs, spiritual development, mental health, etc., and to optimize operational effectiveness.



Leader training resources and training materials production management

To optimize the management of hardware and software for leader training resources, the Branch embarked on a plan to establish an electronic resource centre for leader training, and create a better environment for the development of audio-visual training materials production.

Publications

In addition to the publication of *Knotcraft 1* and *Seamanship*, the online version of *New Leaders' Handbook* was also published this year. At the same time, Chinese translation of *Safe from Harm Self-Assessment Tool* and *Wood Badge Framework* of the World Organization of the Scout Movement were completed.

The outbreak of COVID-19 did not deter Scout members from caring for the community. To echo the "Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard" programme of the Association, Development & Adult Resources Branch organized five activities with some 1,000 participants in the year. Highlights of these activities are as follows:

“Salute to Health Care Professionals” Colouring & Drawing Activity

With overwhelming response, “Salute to Health Care Professionals” colouring and drawing activity received more than 500 entries from 51 Scout Groups. There were 228 Grasshoppers and 292 Cub Scouts expressed their gratitude to the health care professionals by drawing and blessing messages. Selected entries were printed as greeting cards and presented to frontline health care providers to thank for their contribution during the pandemic.



CNY Blessing Video for the Elderly

In order to take care of the well-being of the elderly who were lack of social connection amid the epidemic, 371 Scout members were involved in the production of 150 short videos to give their Chinese New Year blessings to the aged staying at home or the elderly care centres. Those short videos were edited into six video clips and broadcasted to the seniors via 16 neighbourhood elderly centres and elderly community centres, encouraging them to stay positive during the pandemic.



First Aid Training & Service

Our Association continued to organize First Aid training courses recognized by Commissioner for Labour under the provision of *Occupational Safety & Health Regulation, Chapter 509A*. In the year under review, one First Aid Certificate Course, eight Refresher Trainings for First Aid Certificate Course, two CPR & AED courses as well as a First Aid Badge Training Course for Scout Section were arranged. Around 150 people completed the courses.

For the safety of Scout members and First Aid Team members, infection control guidelines on first aid training and service during COVID-19 pandemic were imposed. For first aid training, the number of participants of various training courses were reduced while infection prevention practices were adopted. On the other hand, personal protective equipment and relevant training were arranged to first aid service team for the provision of first aid service.

An internal training on accident management of backcountry activities was held in November 2020. A pilot and an air crewman officer of the Government Flying Service (GFS) introduced their search and rescue operations to our First Aid Team members. With the sharing from our guest speakers and demonstration on transferring the injured with professional tools, our First Aid Team members had learned and were prepared to assist in the helicopter rescue operations in the wild in the future.




Do your Best, Serve the Community

To encourage Scout members to lend a helping hand to people in need during the difficult time, Public Relations Branch launched a new Theme of the Year “Do your Best, Serve the Community” in 2020-2021. Scout members and Scout units were encouraged to participate in the “Do your Best Action” to share and record the good deeds in daily lives, and to organize community services for society. Members could also join online activities to share health tips, complete wish cards and upload theme-related short essays or pictures to different social media. By the end of March 2021, about 1,000 members had joined various Scout theme events.



Disseminating Scouting news via online platforms


Online platforms were used to disseminate information during the pandemic. Latest Scout activities arrangements were announced on the Association’s website and Facebook page. Resources were also shared on Facebook page, including the “Stay Learning Programme” self-learning videos launched by Training Branch and teaching video clips produced by Scout groups. The online materials enabled Scout members to keep learning Scouting skills while staying at home. Furthermore, online meetings were organized to let Scout members get together when face-to-face activities were suspended. Besides, the official Instagram account of the Association was set up on 1 January 2021 to further promote Hong Kong Scouting via different social media platforms.



Enriching Hong Kong Scouting

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the editorial group of *Hong Kong Scouting* magazine prepared related feature articles, e.g. “Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard” to introduce health tips for fighting the virus; “Scouting under the pandemic” to report how leaders continued Scout activities during the pandemic and “Go Hiking” to encourage members to explore the nature.

Besides, Scout stories, e.g. “Scout Families”, “Centenary of World Scout Jamboree”, “Better World Framework”, etc., were published to enrich the content of the magazine. Scouters were also invited to contribute feature articles, namely “Advanced Techniques for Photography”, “Geocaching”, “Scout Martial Arts” and “Cooking Scout”.



110th Anniversary of Hong Kong Scouting

The year 2021 marked the 110th anniversary of Hong Kong Scouting. “Hong Kong Scout 110th Anniversary Kick-off Ceremony” was held on 30 October 2020 to introduce to the press the milestones of Hong Kong Scout Movement, as well as the forthcoming celebration events. Community leaders Sir Gordon WU, Mr Karson CHOI, Prof Gabriel LEUNG, Mr LAM Chiu-ying, Mr David LIE and Mr CHIU Tsang-hei were invited to the ceremony to share their Scout memories and how the Scout Law had inspired and guided them all along.





Activities for JOTI - Special Edition in Hong Kong

To echo the World Organization of the Scout Movement's (WOSM) activity – JOTI Special Edition from 3 to 5 April 2020, International Branch launched a series of online activities during the same period for members to connect with Scouts around the world and to experience the fun of Scouting while staying at home during the epidemic. There were altogether 2,867 people participated in more than 60 online programmes. Apart from watching different topics in the "Virtual Classroom" online, participants' awareness of the epidemic had also been raised through quiz games. They could even produce a short video clip to deliver the anti-epidemic message to all parts of the world.

Scout Health Guard Programme – Hong Kong-Nepal Connect

To express our care for Nepalese who are residing in Hong Kong, International Branch distributed anti-epidemic packages to The Gurkha Cemeteries Trust on 17 May 2020 so as to fight the epidemic together.

Opening of the World Scout Academy



In order to offer more learning and exchange opportunities for adult members from all over the world, WOSM launched an online platform "The World Scout Academy" on 20 June 2020. A series of online learning sessions had been provided from June to August. Five representatives and six observers from our Association participated in the first online session and kicked off for the Academy with 350 representatives from the management of different National Scout Organizations (NSOs).

The 63rd Jamboree-On-The-Air (JOTA) cum The 24th Jamboree-On-The-Internet (JOTI)

The 63rd Jamboree-On-The-Air (JOTA) cum The 24th Jamboree-On-The-Internet (JOTI) was held online from 16 to 18 October 2020 and nearly 400 participants successfully completed the activities. A series of online special programmes covering science, astronomy, physics, the climate change, local traditional culture and fine art etc., were provided so as to encourage participants to stay positive and adapt to the new normal. In addition, there was a QSL card colouring contest and a quiz game to enhance members' knowledge about radio.



COVID-19 Scout Action Report

In June 2020, our Association submitted a report to the World Scout Bureau Asia-Pacific Support Centre for the measures and works which we had undertaken during the epidemic period. The relevant content had been published on WOSM's website, in the Asia-Pacific Scout Periodical News *Info* and in the Asia-Pacific Region NSO COVID-19 Response Special Report.



Best Practice Sharing

The 2nd Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Education Forum hosted by the World Scout Bureau Asia-Pacific Support Centre was held online from 1 to 12 December 2020. On 9 December 2020, our Association was invited to share by way of a video clip on "How to implement Youth Programme Policies effectively in the modern world", and discussed on the ways to promote policies on youth programme to NSOs through world and regional policies, activity frameworks and platforms. To strengthen NSOs' fundraising ability, WOSM launched a total of four interactive webinars throughout the months of February and March 2021, and invited our Association to share the experiences on "Best Practices from NSOs on Corporate Partnerships" in the webinar held on 11 March 2021.



Asia-Pacific Regional Awards

The Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Committee announced the 2020 award list to recognize members' contributions to the Scout Movement in the Asia-Pacific Region. Among them, Mr Jason NG Ka-leung, Deputy Chief Commissioner (Programme & Training), received the APR Chairman's Award, while Mr Horace HO Man-kit, Chairman of Finance Committee and Mr Ivan TAM, Vice Chairman of Scoutcraft Authority were awarded the APR Certificate of Good Service.

Memorandum of Cooperation with Sichuan

To sustain the spirit and the goal of "Sichuan Youth Quality Training Project", the Association once again signed the *Memorandum of Cooperation with Miayang and Deyang Youth Federations*, committing, for the sake of benefit of youth in Mainland, to provide support on volunteers training and youth exchange activities between Hong Kong and Sichuan between 2020 and 2023.


Scout Health Guard Programme – HongKong-NingXia Connect

In response to the Association's "Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard" Programme, 24 leaders from Mainland Affairs Branch together with members of Hong Kong-NingXia Youth Exchange Promotion Association gathered at The Friends of Scouting Jockey Club Kai Yip Service Centre for Children & Youth in April 2020 for packaging masks and anti-epidemic materials donated by The Hong Kong Jockey Club, Hong Kong-NingXia Youth Exchange Promotion Association and The Friends of Scouting respectively. They also sent their care by distributing the packages to 200 people in need in the community including singleton elderly, ethnic minorities and low-income families.



Sichuan Train the Trainers Service Project

Despite the impossibility to have face-to-face interaction during the outbreak of pandemic, our Association still maintained cooperation and liaison with volunteers from Miayang and Deyang Youth Federations for the development of youth training. From October 2020 to March 2021, leaders from Mainland Affairs Branch conducted a total of seven online training sessions for 300 volunteers from Miayang and Deyang under the themes of "learning through playing" and "first aid concept". These volunteers received not only skills for hosting activities and training but also completed the practical session under the guidance of our leaders online.



Launch of Mainland Affairs Branch Social Media Platforms

The Facebook and Instagram Pages of Mainland Affairs Branch were officially launched in October 2020. In addition to sharing the latest information and event highlights of the Branch, they also introduced the customs and traditional characteristics of Chinese culture, and thus provided our Scout members with a more comprehensive knowledge and understanding of our country.



Sustainable Development Workshop for Leaders

In order to enable different regions and units to have a deeper knowledge and understanding of the methods and procedures of organizing Scout activities in the Mainland, Mainland Affairs Branch organized a workshop on "Notarized Documents Required for Organizing Activities in the Mainland" in March 2021. Co-chaired by Mr SHUM Man-kyong, Chairman of The Friends of Scouting and Mr FONG Shun-yiu, Assistant Mainland Affairs Commissioner (Special Projects), topics on relevant laws and regulations of the Mainland, the application procedures, the required documents as well as matters needing attention when organizing an event in Mainland were explained in a simple and clear way.





Development of Association Properties

A LED wall for replacement of the poster panel was installed at the G/F lift lobby of Hong Kong Scout Centre in the second quarter of 2020 to promote Scout activities.

In the third quarter of 2020, the fitting out of the new Gilwell Corner at 9/F of Hong Kong Scout Centre was completed. Following its opening ceremony on 26 September 2020, the new Gilwell Corner is opened for Scout members. Equipped with computer and internet service and furnished with different combination of worktop and seating and Scout souvenir display cabinet, the venue provides a cozy place for small group discussion and social gathering.



Capital Works for Campsites and Activity Centres

Estate Branch oversees the Association-funded improvement projects at campsites and activity centres. Premises benefited during the year included Tai Tam Scout Centre, Gilwell Campsite, Pak Sha Wan Tam Wah Ching Sea Activity Centre, Shap Pat Heung District Headquarters, Law Ting Pong Scout Center and Wong Siu Sang Leadership Training Centre. The major works include seawall reinstatement works at Wong Siu Sang Leadership Training Centre.

Besides, funds from Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust for the improvement works at Tai Tam Scout Centre and Pak Sha Wan Tam Wah Ching Sea Activity Centre were granted.



Hong Kong Scout 110th Anniversary Raffle Campaign

Annual Raffle Campaign is to help Scout groups, districts, regions and other units of the Association to raise funds for their operation, programmes and training. To celebrate the 110th Anniversary of Hong Kong Scouting, the Campaign this year was specifically named in this respect. The Raffle Draw was conducted on 27 March 2021 webcasting live on the Association's Facebook amid the pandemic situation. Participants were restricted to esteemed prize-drawing guests and working staff. Altogether, 101 lucky prize winners were drawn under the witness of an independent auditor from a Certified Public Accountant firm.



Staff Affairs

Health and safety of our staff has always been our top priority. To safeguard their safety as well as to maintain smooth operational needs under the epidemic, the Association implemented special work arrangements including but not limited to work from home. Also, anti-epidemic kits were gifted to the staff as our caring and appreciation.



The Safety Management Policy for Campsites and Activity Centres had been formulated this year to provide advice and guidelines for camp staff to create a safe working environment. In addition, the Campsites and Activity Centres Occupational Safety Committee had also been established for developing and monitoring safety management systems and guidelines for campsites. Members of the Committee would arrange visits to campsites to conduct inspections on safety measurement. They would also provide professional advice on occupational safety and health as well as to recommend and arrange training classes and seminars for camp staff in order to enhance their safety awareness in their daily work.



Information Technology

The epidemic situation of COVID-19 had great impact on Scout activities and training as well as office operation. Thankfully, the application of IT helped to maintain normal operation to some extent. With the timely support from IT office, it allowed individual staff to work from home, the Association Headquarters and regions could also conduct online meetings and run e-learning. Tips on information security and personal data privacy protection were also provided as reminders.

In early 2020, the Chief Commissioner announced the "Triennial Plan 2020-2023". Enhanced use of IT in Scouting was one of the key targets. Following this, the Association set up the Information and Communication Technology Strategy Task Force to explore the system development needs for the coming five years and draw up development blueprint. Implementation would be in phases and take into account the actual needs and situation.

In addition, IT Office continued to assist various units in the development, optimisation and maintenance of their systems. These included Youth Membership Information System, new Association website, Venue Booking System, Training Management System and Online Recruitment System. Its fresh look and user-friendly design facilitated members to browse Scouting information easily.



Regions

Hong Kong Island Region

Maintaining Regular Meetings and Activities

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected the society and our living, including Scout activities. In order to maintain the essential progressive training for Scout members, front-line leaders act quickly and arranged online Scout group meetings, training and activities. In addition, the Region arranged Google Site platform and offered free email accounts with large storage capacity to leaders through the hkiscout.org.hk email system to maintain smooth delivery of training materials and communication. The Region organized 64 activities, training courses and competitions with a total of 2,044 participants.



HKIR x ORBIS – a Win-Win Collaboration

With the increasing awareness to support the underprivileged, the Region collaborated with ORBIS in organizing Cub Scout and Scout Disability Awareness courses and the Venture Scout Self-reliance workshop. These activities promoted the ideas of acceptance, inclusion, support and respect for those in need.

Due to the pandemic, face-to-face Scout meetings were suspended, not to mention the pursuing of any proficiency badges. The Association Programme Branch thus introduced "Online Learning and Progressive Award Online Assessment Scheme under the Epidemic" which enabled youth members to undertake learning at home and engage in Scout activities and award assessments with alternative arrangements. On the other hand, 99 Cub Scouts, 17 Scouts and three Venture Scouts were awarded the Golden Bauhinia Award, Chief Scout's Award and Dragon Scout Award respectively in 2020-2021.

Better Education in Promoting Environmental Protection

In October 2020, Tai Tam Scout Centre was granted by The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust to renovate and expand the campsite facilities including a redevelopment of the administration building and an inclusion of new barrier free access facilities. Tai Tam Scout Centre was also proud to become the first SCENES (Scout Centres of Excellence for Nature, Environment, and Sustainability) in Hong Kong as recognized by WOSM (World Organization of the Scout Movement). With its opening in January 2021, the Centre would serve to better promote environmental protection education. The campfire ground was also renovated in 2020 with a subsidy from the Lions Club Victoria Hong Kong. It was expanded by converting the original four-side seating to three-side seating with a performing stage and a Totem pole with district logos that would bring new features to the campfire activities.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Centre was closed most of the time last year and have served 1,259 campers.



Adopting Advance IT Technology for Better Scouting

Advanced IT technology was used in Scouting during the pandemic. The HKIR Training Team had taken an active and leading role in launching training activities using Google Sites. Various software was used for online applications, training, activities, teaching and feedbacks collections. In the past year, 13 courses and workshops were held with 255 participants. There were 13 Scout leaders attained the Wood Badges.



Enhancing Scouting in the New Normal

Although the spread of the pandemic had been slowed down, it was still challenging in bringing Scout activities back to normal. The use of internet and online platforms would become more substantial in conducting training and activities, thus the Region would upgrade more equipment to facilitate online events. In the meantime, the revamped Region website provided faster and better user experiences.

2021 is the 110th anniversary of the Hong Kong Scouting. The success of Scouting relies on the invaluable dedication of leaders and supporters of the Movement. Looking to the future, Scouting will remain dynamic in coping with the changing needs of the young people and contributing to nurture youngsters' holistic development.

Kowloon Region

Continual Development

Scout Movement in Hong Kong stepped into its 110th anniversary and developed for more than a centenary. The Region continued to plan the projects according to the development direction of the Association, and included the Sustainable Development Goals promulgated by World Organization of the Scout Movement to achieve the vision for common development. For financial management, the Region briefed its departments and districts the revised *Guidance Notes on Finance Matters* of the Association to remind comprehension and compliance. For administration, the storage space allocation was conducted with new filing cabinets installed to enhance document storage work. For information technology, website vendor was appointed to revamp the webpage of the Region to upgrade communication effectiveness.



Activities and Projects

In the circumstances of the COVID-19 epidemic, the Region produced surgical masks for distribution, held a fight-the-virus online quiz game, set up a platform for progressive badge training and provided epidemic prevention information. This year many activities and training were forced to postpone and cancel. The Region utilized information technology aided operations and adopted sessional learning mode by teaching the theory part online in prior stage to attain ideal result. The training and activities adopted the aforesaid learning mode included sectional training, air activities and leaders training, such as Scout Pioneering Course, Venture Scout Map Reading Training Course, Venture Scout Fire Fighting Course, Venture Scout Expedition Training Course, Rover Scout Introductory Course, 1st Advanced Air Activity Badge Course, General Information Course, workshops regarding setting of career development target for Scouts aided by interviewing tools and application on multi-media software via mobile phones or tablets etc. Besides, the Region also coordinated the assessments in different sections of all districts under the "New Normal".



The Region took another approach to hold crucial meetings and activities under the pandemic, including approvals of annual budget by circulation and membership lists of Scout Council and sub-committees, arrangement of Annual General Meeting under special restrictions to accept the membership lists and financial statements, holding of online 52nd Inauguration Ceremony cum Lunar New Year Reception to maintain connection with lay members. The Lay Members Orientation 2020-2021 introduced major events at the Association and Regional levels in the coming year.

Year 2020 was the 60th anniversary celebration for Gilwell Campsite. The Region published a bulletin namely *Gilwell HK 60* to mark the event in which the campsite history, outlook and infrastructure variations, activities highlights, interviews of key members were all documented and supplemented with a set of commemorative badges and first day cover. For the capital improvements, there completed the replacement of footpath coverings near camping grounds, the re-roofing and interior refurbishment at the Golden Jubilee Lodge, and landslide remedial works. It was expected that the slope repair works at the Activity Square would be completed by the second quarter of 2021.



Region's Statistics

As at the end of December 2020, the Region had a total of 13,790 members and 227 Scout groups with some decrements as compared with last year; the Region and districts have reviewed the situation and revised the retaining and recruitment scheme for continual implementation. This year, 366 participants attended 21 Scout activities and training courses. The number of Scouts achieving the highest award reached 137, including 116 Golden Bauhinia Awardees, 14 Chief Scout's Awardees and seven Dragon Scout Awardees. A total of 27 leaders successfully attained the Wood Badges.

Face the Challenges

With the impacts of the COVID-19 epidemic, Scout activities and training were affected largely. To face the challenges, the Region grasped time to well equip in advance the administrative efficiency and reinforce all the supportive work before the launch of planned projects.



East Kowloon Region



Scouting during Pandemic

Due to the pandemic, many face-to-face Scout trainings and activities were cancelled in the past year. In order to keep members connected with Scout life and adjust to "New Normal", East Kowloon Region conducted a series of workshops and activities to equip Training Team members with online interactive and facilitation skills. Furthermore, the Region organized 19 different workshops and activities aimed at sharing information with 440 leaders in organizing and planning online Scout troop meetings. When the epidemic had been gradually subsiding, the Region launched the "Group/Troop Meeting Support Scheme" which East Kowloon Scout groups could use Pak Sha Wan Tam Wah Ching Sea Activity Centre for outdoor meetings with a very low cost.

In view of the spread of COVID-19, the Centre gradually resumed its service in a safe and orderly manner. To minimize the risk, various precautionary measures subject to the epidemic situations had been implemented, such as cleaning and sanitizing the public facilities frequently. Moreover, the Centre purchased various anti-epidemic facilities, such as thermal imager, hand sanitizer, toilet seat sanitizer, etc. When the Centre was temporarily closed, numerous repair and maintenance projects were carried out, such as slope maintenance, tree pruning, cat ladder setup, mesh fences repairment, etc. Also, with the help of Regional Sea Activity Instructor Unit, recreation crafts were maintained in good condition. With the grant by Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation (Main Fund) Non-capital Works Project, safety equipment for pioneering were purchased this year. On the other hand, the Centre was funded by The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust to carry out improvement works and launch new environmental programmes. A Centre Improvement Team had been set up and a consultant firm was appointed to implement the design and tender jobs. The Centre would be closed between late 2021 and early 2022 for construction works. We looked forward to meeting a refreshing campsite and offering a brand new experience to campers next year.



Helping Others to Help Yourself

Thanks to generous supports and donations from Jockey Club "COVID-19 Emergency Fund" and Regional Lay Members, we distributed anti-epidemic caring packs to the needy people in East Kowloon Region at the very early stage of the pandemic. With the support of Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department (AFCD), the Region kept on promoting sustainable trail management and the fundamental principle of "Leave No Trace" (LNT) to our members and the public. When the epidemic had been subsiding, the Region organized "Drainage Canals Cleaning Workshop" with AFCD and mobilized leaders to clean-up the canals and assisted the AFCD staff to repair hiking trails inside the country parks. Furthermore, a series of first aid workshops and activities (such as First Aid Workshop for Hikers, Basic Life Support & Automated External Defibrillation Provider Course) were organized to promote the concept of "First Aid for All" and the value of self-respect and respect for others.



New Territories Region



Scout Life under the "New Normal"

Under pandemic of the COVID-19, many planned Scout activities and training courses cannot be proceeded as scheduled. To maintain the regular Scout training for our youth members and leaders, a specialist team was formed to update the content of our Facebook page "NT308". The team not only produced videos enhancing precautionary messages, but also provided useful information about online meetings for Scout groups. Lovely characters "NTSIR", "Wo Yi Hop" and "RT-308" were created to share some health tips with our members. Resources were shared on "NT308" to allow leaders to organize online activities and keep contact with their members. The commissioners of New Territories Region (NTR) promoted positive messages via videos during the time we were forced to stay at home. Several regional activities were held online for the first time, including the "DC workshop for Schools-Scouts Collaboration Scheme", "Award Ceremony for Youth Award and Distinguished Groups 2020" and "Chinese New Year Reception 2021". These activities attracted many members and leaders to join under this pandemic situation. In addition, the Programme & Training Division would establish an online platform to provide fruitful training information for future Scout training.



Updated version of NTR App

The NTR App was firstly launched in 2015 to deliver Region's messages to members and leaders. To improve the efficiency in information dissemination, the NTR App had been updated to NTR 2.0 version with a new interface. The improved push notification function promoted Regional activities more effectively and was able to notify members once any emergency affecting our activities. Besides, a clearer directory for circulars and perfection in activity photos browsing and downloading facilitated members for a better understanding of our Region. Videos about Scouting skills were being produced to fresh up the content of the App. This year, NTR IT team planned a revamp of our website by adding more interactive content and strengthening the efficiency in spreading messages. Customized email boxes with the NTR domain would be offered to commissioners for better project management as well as better communication.



Welcoming the 110th Anniversary of Hong Kong Scouting

NTR planned three challenging activities to celebrate the 110th anniversary of Hong Kong Scouting, namely "Pioneering Challenge", "Legend in Campfire & Wild Cooking" and "Run for Scout 110". The pandemic introduced an unexpected new level of uncertainty into all our lives and in organizing events, we would be united and work together optimistically to overcome all challenges.



New Territories East Region

Keep Scouting active from home – Virtual Scouting

As at 31 December 2020, members of the New Territories East Region (NTER) had reached 10,055 with a total of 212 Scout groups. In view of the COVID-19 outbreak, face-to-face training and Scout activities were suspended and replaced by online meetings. Thanks to NTER's dedicated frontline leaders, regular virtual Scout group meetings and online Scout activities were arranged to keep our youth members engaged during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Region organized 15 activities for youth members and five leader training courses while 12 leaders successfully completed the Wood Badge training in the past year. The number of Scouts achieving the highest awards was 32. Membership expansion and providing adequate support to youths to gain the highest awards would be our key missions in the future.



Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard

NTER organized various activities to encourage our members to fight against the virus together. Apart from maintaining good personal and environmental hygiene, we continued to instill positive values and attitudes into members, such as being responsible to families, community and society as well as caring for other people. Programmes included DIY hand rub, Facebook profile picture (fight the virus) stickers, lyrics contest by adapting the song *I am a little teapot*, "Keep our home clean" campaign, tongue twister competition, distribution of care packs and face masks to the disadvantaged in the community (including low-income families and the elderly).



The New Normal – Online activities

As Scout gatherings had been suspended amid the COVID-19 pandemic in Hong Kong, online Scout activities and blended learning had become popular. NTER organized many activities for members such as "Grasshopper-stay-at-home challenge", "Cub Scouts always do their best" and "Non-stop Scouting". A task force formed by our young members helped to design games (e.g. coding games) which were uploaded on NTER's Facebook page on weekly/ bi-weekly basis. These effective approaches made Scout activities and trainings more flexible and personalized.



New strategic plan to enhance sustainable development

Our prioritized missions in the coming year included enhancing the connection with Scout districts and groups, membership retention and expansion, enhancing youth involvement, building a good image of Scouting and optimizing the Talent Resource Management. New strategic action plans were formulated and would be executed by commissioners-in-charge. Members of the NTER would join hands and walk out from the darkness of the epidemic together.

Headquarters Subsidiaries

Leadership Training Institute (LTI)

In 2020-2021, LTI conducted three QF Level 3 learning programmes, viz. two sessions of *Certificate in Expedition Skills* and one session of *Certificate in Adventure Education: Principles and Application*. Mixed teaching mode was responsively adopted. The lectures were conducted virtually while the outdoor practices were carried out strictly under the Scout activities guidelines and the government precautionary measures.

There were some events successfully held online: "HK Scout 110th Anniversary – LTI Annual Seminar: From the Earth to the Sky – Meteorological and Our Scouting Life", credit-bearing *Leadership in Practice* course collaborating with United College of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, LTI Commissioners Retreat, Board of Examiners Meeting, etc.



Scout Association of Hong Kong Aviation Training Centre

The Centre committed to promote the Association's principle in the popularization of air activities. During the pandemic, the Centre managed to organize a variety of aviation-related workshops by a flexible combination of online learning and face-to-face practical sessions, such as Full-Motion-Simulator Operator Workshops, PPL Ground School Theory Workshop and Basic-Simulator Operator Workshops.

The Centre organized a workshop to visit the Hong Kong International Airport (HKIA) on 7 November 2020. There were 42 aviation interested Air Scouts and leaders participated. An introduction of the HKIA was firstly given, followed by a tour to the non-restricted area in the terminal building and the airside. The fruitful activity helped our members to develop a more comprehensive understanding of the operation of HKIA.

This year, the Centre had contributed in different aircrew badge training courses organized by Programme Branch for 18 members, provided 53.5 hours of flight simulator training. The total patronage has accumulated to 506 heads in workshops and fun days.



Wong Siu Sang Leadership Training Centre

This year, the Centre offered 56 programmes with a total of 1,350 participants. An interesting online programme "Messengers of Peace – Dialogue with Nature" was successfully held and reached 463 participants. Besides, the repair works of the seawall after typhoon Mangkhut was smoothly completed.



Scout Association of Hong Kong Library (SAHK Library)

The SAHK Library comprises a reading area and a discussion zone. The self-service circulation station and the new library management system help to provide a more efficient and enjoyable user experience. Furthermore, SAHK Library organized various workshops to encourage knowledge exchange and provoke new ideas, for example, the online seminar "Scout section and meteorological" was held in December.

The Friends of Scouting

Under the mission of "Creating favourable circumstances for young people to develop themselves and make contribution to the community", The Friends of Scouting (FOS) assists the Association in extending the services to non-uniform youth. Two service centres for children & youth located at Kai Yip and Long Ping dedicated to provide services to youth and their families in their districts. Together with the School Social Work Service Team, they provide stationing service to 17 schools. The Education Centre strives to organize various academic and interest courses to provide learning opportunities to people of different walks of life. FOS is also the Sponsor of 10 Scout groups. To expand the service areas, FOS enhances the collaboration with other departments in Association and organizations.



Change under Pandemic

To fight against the virus, FOS provided continuous support to the youth in need and their families. To echo the call for "Suspending Classes without Suspending Learning" and the needs of students, the "I 10 Computer package Sponsorship to Needy Students Scheme" was launched. It provided eligible youth with refurbished computers collected from corporate donations. In addition to distribute epidemic prevention packages regularly and educate the youth how to protect themselves from the virus, FOS also provided progressive online trainings through various online platforms, such as zoom live groups, Youtube/ Facebook online workshops and multi-media training kits to youth.



Care for the mental health of youth

In response to the widespread public concerns on youth mental health in recent years, "Listen to me" scheme was co-organized by FOS and outside body. Questionnaires on parent-child communication were successfully collected from youth and parents and the result of the survey cum opening ceremony of the scheme was held on 28 March 2021. The scheme encouraged parents to be the "gatekeeper" and communicate with youth to strengthen the parent-child relationship and enhance the positive mental health of the youth. Moreover, FOS continued to promote the concept of "mental health gatekeeper" through "Hope, Love, Care – Drama Project". A total of 40 trained young people shared their experience and offered training to 150 youths. "Mental Health" was also the theme of School Social Work Service Team in 2020-2021, aimed at raising the awareness of mental health of students.

Diversified Service for the Youth

"Know the Future" project and "Life Planning" projects provided workplace experience and employment counselling services to the youth in need, and provided support services to 33 secondary schools. The projects also offered placements for dozens of students to experience real job life. "Body Mind Spirit – SEN Support Scheme" was the projects for children with Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) or autism spectrum disorders and their parents. Furthermore, a wide range of activities were organized for minority ethnicities.



"We Grow Together" – 20th Anniversary Commemorative Book

The School Social Work Service Team provides stationing service for 10 secondary schools and the scope of services includes individual counselling, group and developmental work, parent education and community service. In 2020-2021, 240 programmes/groups with a total attendance of 26,843



were held and 1,030 cases were handled by the team. To celebrate the 20th anniversary, School Social Work Service Team published an anniversary commemorative book in November 2020 which recorded the development of the unit and the sharing from colleagues and stakeholders.

Comprehensive Education Service

The Education Centre organized a total of 190 courses and 118 subvented courses comprising 40 courses of Adult Education and 78 courses funded by Employees Retraining Board (ERB). The Centre has been awarded with "ERB Outstanding Course Management Award" in the "ERB Annual Award Presentation 2020-2021" to acknowledge its dedication in providing quality training and services to students.



The Baden-Powell Scout Club of Hong Kong

The establishment of The Baden-Powell Scout Club of Hong Kong (BP Club) is to uphold the fellowship among serving and retired Scout members in Hong Kong, encouraging them to keep the Scout Promise and Law as well as the spirit of Scouting.

Expansion of BP Club's Sub-Clubs

To encourage more retired Scout members to maintain Scout spirit, three briefing sessions were arranged to Scout regions, districts and Scout groups in October and December 2020, inviting them to set up BP Club's Sub-Clubs. The establishment of Sub-Clubs not only strengthens the relationship among serving and retired uniformed and Lay Members but also achieves the Association's long-term target on member retention.



Community Service during Pandemic

The outbreak of COVID-19 did not deter BP Club Service Team from serving the community. Despite the suspension of regular visits to the elderly, a short video with a variety of entertainments including Erhu, classic songs and traditional Scout songs performances as well as blessings was produced and uploaded to the Facebook pages of our Association and Hong Kong PHAB Association on 16 November 2020 to convey our love and care to the elderly via social media platforms, accompanied them to fight against the virus while staying at home.



In addition, members of the service team also volunteered to provide support at the quarantine centre in Tso Kung Tam. They also assisted in the "Hong Kong Scout – Health Guard" programme by packing anti-epidemic gift packs for distribution to the needy.

To encourage our members to keep healthy during the pandemic, a short video of stretching exercise was produced and broadcasted on social media platforms in December 2020 to share with our members how to do basic stretching exercise at home. This was also the first year for BP Club to give Lunar New Year blessings online and stay connected with our members on internet.

Diversified Interest Classes and Activities

As always, a wide range of interest classes including Erhu, Gaohu & Zhunghu as well as Cantonese Opera were organized to our members. Furthermore, our Wine Society also arranged a French wine tasting gathering in November 2020 and invited a specialist to introduce the knowledge on wine tasting and characteristics of different wines to our members.

Several new products were launched this year, including Sunny Doll Badge Series and stickers with design concept based on the appearance of boy and girl Cub Scouts, Scouts, Sea Scouts, Air Scouts and Venture Scouts. There was also a cross-over project with Victorinox to introduce two army knife models, namely Spartan and Huntsman, featured with "HKSCOUT SINCE 1911" graphic design in different colors.



Special sales promotion

This year, the Scout Shop had a first ever promotion to offer fortune bags. Both two types of fortune bags had a number of featured products inside, including self-developed merchandise, together with badges of past Scout events, souvenirs of the Centenary and 105th Anniversary Jamborees, Scout Rally Badges, Scout Souvenir Covers, etc. of high commemorative value as free gifts. All fortune bags were snapped up within a short period of time.

The Scout Shop continued to work with different suppliers of outdoor gears for special offers to Scout members. Apart from Scout exclusive offer of camping gear sets, there were also promotional offers of other outdoor gears such as backpacks, sling bags, hiking poles, water bottles, cups, rain ponchos and foldable cutlery.

The Chinese Restaurant is a comfortable venue serving Cantonese cuisine with signature dishes and dim sum. New menus offering seasonal and festive food are introduced from time to time to bring delights to members. Brownsea Lounge is a pleasant outdoor venue adorned with greenery and embraced by spectacular harbour views for social gathering. Impessa Bar is a nice place for members to chitchat and sharing fun in Scouting with fellow members and friends.

Brownsea Lounge has all along been an ideal place for social gathering. This year, the Club added a variety of plants to furnish the place into a more comfortable outdoor environment and turned it into an enchanting garden.

Under the impact of COVID-19, the services of the Chinese Restaurant were affected. Although the Club could not organize the Chinese New Year Reception for members as usual, a video was specially produced to convey the sincere blessings to members.



B P International House



Operation

The COVID-19 outbreak had hit the travel industry hard across the globe. According to the Hong Kong Tourism Board, visitor arrivals fell sharply by 93.6% to 3.57 million people in 2020. B P International House (BPIH) faced the same difficult situation just as other Hong Kong hotels. To address the fall in occupancy and average room rate, BPIH had been striving hard to implement various measures to adapt to the current market situation, to save costs and to adjust strategies to sustain the operation amid the pandemic.

Facilities Upgrade

In 2020, BPIH enhanced the direct booking performance and offered flexible staycation packages targeting the domestic market. BPIH also participated in the Hong Kong Tourism Board's "Staycation Delights" programme. Cafe by the Park offered takeaway service and weekend brunch to cater to the local demand as well. The room renovation of the top floors and the elevator upgrade had almost completed; the refurbishing works for other rooms were under progress. It was expected that the new room design and the facility upgrade would bring guests a warm and comforting stay at BPIH.

In the midst of the pandemic, BPIH joined the "Anti-epidemic Hygiene Measures Certification Scheme" by Hong Kong Quality Assurance Agency partnered with the Hong Kong Tourism Board to upkeep strict hygiene standard. In addition, it also launched an interactive virtual reality (VR) site inspection 3D model for Gordon Wu Hall, which offered guests an immersive experience during the Covid.



Community Services

BPIH continues to fulfil its corporate social responsibility by making efforts in environmental protection, including "Earth Hour by WWF" and "Energy Saving Charter 2020". In addition, it cooperated with The Friends of Scouting to provide internship opportunities for the younger ones, helping them to understand more about hotel operations.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

(a) Organisation and activities

Scout Association of Hong Kong (the "Association") is a body corporate with perpetual succession established under the Scout Association of Hong Kong Ordinance (Chapter 105) of the Laws of Hong Kong for the purpose of furthering and promoting the Scout Movement in the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region ("HKSAR").

The Association established The Hong Kong Scout Foundation (the "Foundation") in accordance with the Scout Association of Hong Kong Ordinance. On creation or dissolution of the Foundation Management Committee, the Association would be the legal owner of all funds and assets under the name of the Foundation.

(b) Operations included in the financial statements

The financial statements include the operations of the following:

- Headquarters of Scout Association of Hong Kong ("Scout Headquarters");
- The Foundation;
- The Scout Shop of Hong Kong (the "Scout Shop");
- 11 International House ("IHouse");
- Hong Kong Island Region, Kowloon Region, East Kowloon Region, New Territories Region and New Territories East Region, including New Territories Region Development Fund Commission and New Territories Campsite & Site Activities Centre Development Fund (collectively known as the "Regions"); and
- Oliver Campsite, Pak She Wan Tam Wan Wah Ching Site Activity Centre, Tai Tam Scout Centre, Tang Tai Scout Centre, Shatin Scout Centre, Tai Mei Tai Site Activity Centre and Choi Ming Lam Kwong Scout Centre (collectively known as the "Campsites").

Their principal activities are as follows:

Scout Headquarters, the Regions and the Campsites:

- Furthering and promoting the Scout Movement in the HKSAR.

The Foundation:

- managing any funds assigned by the Executive Committee of the Association;
- receiving any donations for the Foundation; and
- managing the surplus generated from the investment of the funds.

The Scout Shop:

- selling of Scout uniforms and other accessories.

IHouse:

- operating a hostel.

2.1 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("HKFRS") (which include all Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards, Hong Kong Accounting Standards ("HKAS") and Interpretations) issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants (the "HKICPA"), accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong.

2.2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for equity investments which has been measured at fair value. These financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars ("HK\$") and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand except where otherwise indicated.

2.3 CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND DISCLOSURES

The Association has adopted the *Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting 2018* and the following revised HKFRSs for the first time in the current year's financial statements, which are applicable to the Association.

Amendments to HKFRS 9, HKAS 39 and HKFRS 7	Interest Rate Benchmark Reform - Covid-19-Related Rent Concessions (early adopted)

The nature and the impact of the new standard are described below:

Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting 2018 (the "Conceptual Framework")

The *Conceptual Framework* sets out a comprehensive set of concepts for financial reporting and standard setting, and provides guidance for preparers of financial statements in developing consistent accounting policies and assistance to all parties to understand and interpret the standards. The *Conceptual Framework* is not a standard, and some of the concepts contained therein override the concepts or requirements in any standard. The *Conceptual Framework* did not have any significant impact on the financial position and performance of the Association.

Amendments to HKFRS 9, HKAS 39 and HKFRS 7 Interest Rate Benchmark Reform

Amendments to HKFRS 9, HKAS 39 and HKFRS 7 address the effects of benchmark interest rate reform on financial reporting. The amendments provide temporary relief which enable hedge accounting to continue during the period of uncertainty before the replacement of an existing interest rate benchmark. In addition, the amendments require companies to provide additional information to investors about their hedging relationships which are directly affected by these amendments. The amendments did not have any impact on the financial position and performance of the Association as the Association does not have any interest rate hedge relationships.

Amendments to HKFRS 16 Covid-19-Related Rent Concessions

Amendment to HKFRS 16 provides a practical expedient for lessees to elect not to apply lease modification accounting for rent concessions arising as a direct consequence of the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("Covid-19") pandemic. The practical expedient applies only to rent concessions occurring as a direct consequence of the Covid-19 pandemic and only if (i) the change in lease payments results in a revised consideration for the lease that is substantially the same as, or less than, the consideration for the lease immediately preceding the change; (ii) any reduction in lease payments affects only payments originally due on or before 30 June 2021; and (iii) there is no substantive change to other terms and conditions of the lease. The amendment is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 June 2020 with earlier application permitted and shall be applied retrospectively. The amendments did not have any impact on the financial position and performance of the Association.

Amendments to HKAS 1 and HKAS 8 Definition of Material

Amendments to HKAS 1 and HKAS 8 provide a new definition of material. The new definition states that information is material if omitting, misstating or obscuring it could reasonably be expected to influence decisions that the primary users of general purpose financial statements make on the basis of those financial statements. The amendments clarify that materiality will depend on the nature or magnitude of the information. The amendments did not have any impact on the financial position and performance of the Association.

Fair value measurement

The Association measures its equity investments at fair value at the end of each reporting period. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or settle a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 - based on quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 - based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is observable, either directly or indirectly
- Level 3 - based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Association determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorization (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement) as a whole at the end of each reporting period.

Related parties

A party is considered to be related to the Association if:

- the party is a person or close member of that person's family and that person:
 - has control or joint control over the Association;
 - has significant influence over the Association; or
 - is a member of the key management personnel of the Association;
- the party is an entity where any of the following conditions apply:
 - the entity and the Association are members of the same group;
 - one entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or of a parent, subsidiary or fellow subsidiary of the other entity);
 - the entity and the Association are joint ventures of the same third party;
 - one entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity;
 - the entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the Association or an entity related to the Association;
 - the entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (i);
 - one entity (or its close member of that person's family) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity); and
 - the entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the Association.

Amendments to HKAS 1 *Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current* clarify the requirements for classifying liabilities as current or non-current. The amendments specify that if an entity's right to defer settlement of a liability is subject to the entity complying with specified conditions, the entity has a right to defer settlement of the liability at the end of the reporting period if it complies with those conditions at that date. Classification of a liability is unaffected by the likelihood that the entity will exercise its right to defer settlement of the liability. The amendments also clarify the situations that are considered a settlement of a liability. The amendments are effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2022 and shall be applied retrospectively. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Association's financial statements.

Amendments to HKAS 16 *Property, Plant and Equipment: Proceeds before Intended Use* prohibit entities from deducting from the cost of an item of property, plant and equipment, any proceeds from selling items produced while bringing that item to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. Instead, an entity recognizes the proceeds from selling such items, and the costs of producing those items, in income and expenditure. The amendment is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2022 and must be applied retrospectively to items of property, plant and equipment made available for use on or after the beginning of the earliest period presented where the entity first applies the amendments. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Association's financial statements.

Amendments to HKAS 37 *Onerous Contracts - Cost of Fulfilling a Contract* specify which costs an entity needs to include when assessing whether a contract is onerous or loss-making. The amendments apply a "directly related cost approach". The costs that relate directly to a contract to provide goods or services include both incremental costs and an allocation of costs directly related to contract activities. General and administrative costs do not relate directly to a contract and are excluded unless they are explicitly chargeable to the counterparty under the contract. The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2022. The Association will apply these amendments to contracts for which it has yet fulfilled all its obligations at the beginning of the annual reporting period in which it first applies the amendments.

Expenditure incurred after items of property, plant and equipment have been put into operation, such as repairs and maintenance, is normally charged to income and expenditure in the period in which it is incurred. In situations where the recognition criteria are satisfied, the expenditure for a major inspection is capitalised in the carrying amount of the asset as a replacement. Where significant parts of property, plant and equipment are replaced or replaced at intervals, the Association recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line basis to write off the cost of each item of property, plant and equipment to its residual value over its estimated useful life. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are as follows:

The gain or loss on disposal of items of property, plant and equipment is the difference between the net sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the relevant asset and is recognized in the statement of income and expenditure.

The assets' residual values, useful lives and the depreciation method are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at least at each financial year end.

Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, the cost of that item is allocated on a reasonable basis among the parts and each part is depreciated separately.

An item of property, plant and equipment including any significant part initially recognized is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss on disposal or retirement recognized in income and expenditure in the year the asset is derecognised is the difference between the net sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the relevant asset.

Impairment of non-financial assets

The Association assesses at the end of each reporting period whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired. If such an indication exists, the Association makes an estimate of the asset's recoverable amount.

The recoverable amount of an asset is the higher of its fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the assets. Where an asset does not generate cash inflows largely independent of those from other assets, the recoverable amount is determined for the smallest group of assets that generate cash inflows independently (i.e., a cash-generating unit).

An impairment loss is recognised in income and expenditure whenever the carrying amount of an asset, or the cash-generating unit to which it belongs, exceeds its recoverable amount. The impairment loss is reversed if there has been a favourable change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. A reversal of the impairment loss is limited to the asset's carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised in prior years. The reversal of the impairment loss is credited to income and expenditure in the year in which it arises.

Lease

Lessee

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys a right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. Control is conveyed where the customer has both the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from the use of the identified asset and the right to direct the use of the identified asset. All leases with a term of more than 12 months are recognised as assets representing the right of use of the underlying asset and liabilities representing the obligation to make lease payments, unless the underlying asset is of low value. Both the assets and the liabilities are initially measured on a present value basis. Right-of-use assets are recognised at the commencement date of the lease (that is the date the underlying assets is available for use) and are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liabilities. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the useful lives of the assets and the lease terms. Lease liabilities are initially measured at the present value of lease payments to be made under the lease terms and subsequently adjusted by the effect of the interest on and the settlement of the lease liabilities, and the remeasurement arising from any reassessment of the lease liabilities or lease modifications.

Lessor

When the Association is the lessor, assets leased by the Association are included in non-current assets, and rents receivable are recorded at the statement of income and expenditure on the straight-line basis over the lease terms.

Financial assets

Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financial component or for which the Association has applied the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a significant financial component are measured at the transaction price determined under HKFRS 15. All the other financial assets are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial assets, except in the case of financial assets recorded at fair value through income and expenditure. Regular-way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade date, that is, the date that the Association commits to purchase or sell the assets.

(a) Classification and measurement

Debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, subject to impairment if the assets are held for the collection of contractual cash flows where those contractual cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest.

Equity investments are measured at fair value through profit or loss unless, on initial recognition, the Association has irrevocably elected to designate such investments that are not held for trading as equity investments at fair value through other comprehensive income. Dividends of such investments are recognised in the statement of profit or loss when the Association's right to receive payment is established. Changes in the fair value of such investments are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never recycled to the statement of profit or loss even when the assets are sold.

(b) Impairment

The Association applies the expected credit loss model on all the financial assets that are subject to impairment. For trade receivables without a significant financing component, the Association applies the simplified approach which requires impairment allowance to be measured at lifetime expected credit losses.

For other financial assets, impairment allowances are recognised under the general approach where expected credit losses are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures where there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Association is required to provide for credit losses that result from possible default events within the next 12 months. For those credit exposures where there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure irrespective of the timing of the default.

The Association considers that a default has occurred when a default has occurred more than 90 days past due unless the Association has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more appropriate default criterion should be applied.

(c) Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the assets have expired, or when the Association has transferred its substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership, or where control is not retained.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include lease liabilities, trade payables, other payables, accruals and amounts due to related parties. They are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs. After initial recognition, they are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when they are extinguished, i.e. when the obligation is discharged or cancelled, or expires.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the statement of financial position if, and only if, there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

Reservations

Reservations are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on the first-in, first-out basis. Net realisable value is based on estimated selling prices less any estimated costs to be incurred to completion and disposal.

Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturity of three months or less when acquired.

For the purpose of the statement of financial position, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and at banks, including term deposits, which are not restricted as to use.

Provisions

A provision is recognised when a present obligation (legal or constructive) has arisen as a result of a past event and it is probable that a future outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, provided that a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

When the effect of discounting is material, the amount recognised for a provision is the present value at the end of the reporting period of the future expenditures expected to settle the obligation. The increase in the discounted present value amount arising from the passage of time is included in the statement of income and expenditure.

The Lee Kai Nang Foundation is represented by funds available for Scout development and camping activities.

(m) New Territories East Regional Headquarters Fund

The New Territories East Regional Headquarters Fund is represented by funds available for repair, maintenance and other operating expenses of the New Territories East Regional headquarters.

(n) Ng Tai Tai Scout Fund

The Ng Tai Tai Scout Fund is represented by funds available for provision of financial assistance for activities with the aim of developing the Scout Movement of the East Kowloon Region.

(o) Promoting and Developing Scout Fund

The Promoting and Developing Scout Fund is represented by funds available for assisting the Association to promote and develop scouting.

(p) Scout Performing Arts Foundation

The Scout Performing Arts Foundation is represented by funds available for assisting the Association in performing arts development of Scouts.

(q) Samson Sea Scout Fund

The Samson Sea Scout Fund is represented by funds available for provision of subsidies for the procurement of uniforms for under-privileged youth members of the Association.

(r) Sibhan Relief Fund

The Sibhan Relief Fund is represented by funds available for donation to support the rehabilitation work and related service plans for earthquake victims in Sichuan.

(s) SAHK Leadership Training Institute Foundation

The SAHK Leadership Training Institute Foundation is represented by funds available for supporting leaders' training and continuing education.

Internal designated funds

Internal designated funds are funds established by the Association and are earmarked for special purposes.

(a) Amortisation Reserves

The Amortisation Reserves are represented by the net book value of property, plant and equipment funded by various internal designated funds. Transfer from the internal designated funds represent addition during the year. Transfer to the statement of income and expenditure represent the corresponding depreciation charged for the year.

The Chan Chan Sui World Juniors Fund is represented by funds available for subsidising Scout members to participate in the World Juniors.

(f) Centennial Building Reserve

The Centennial Building Reserve is represented by funds available for major repair and maintenance, improvement works and facilities upgrading of the Hong Kong Scout Centennial Building.

(g) Development Fund

The Development Fund is represented by funds available for provision of funds and assistance for the development of the Scout Movement in the HKSAR.

(h) District Fund

The District Fund is represented by funds available for subsidising District activities in the Kowloon Region.

(i) General Project Fund

The General Project Fund is represented by funds available for provision of grants, loans or revolving funds for the Scout Movement in the Kowloon Region.

(j) International Brotherhood Fund

The International Brotherhood Fund is represented by funds available for the development of the Scout Movement in other countries, especially in developing countries.

(k) New Territories East Region Eddie Kwan Scout Fund

The New Territories East Region Eddie Kwan Scout Fund is represented by funds available for the operations of the New Territories East Region.

(l) New Territories East Region Training Team Development Fund

The New Territories East Region Training Team Development Fund is represented by funds available for provision of funds and assistance for the development of the training team of the New Territories East Region.

(p) Redevelopment Fund

The Redevelopment Fund is represented by funds available for future redevelopment of the Tai Tam Scout Centre and the Hong Kong Island Regional Headquarters.

(q) Regional Headquarters Maintenance Fund

The Regional Headquarters Maintenance Fund is represented by funds available for operations of the Regional Headquarters and the Pak Sha Wan Tam Wah Ching Sea Activity Centre.

(r) Regional Scout Fund

The Regional Scout Fund is represented by funds available for the development and operations of the East Kowloon Region, the New Territories Region and the New Territories East Region.

(s) Scout Development Fund

The Scout Development Fund is represented by funds available for financing scouting activities for the purpose of obtaining and/or expanding membership in the District and Scout Group.

(t) Staff Welfare Fund

The Staff Welfare Fund is represented by funds available for staff welfare and recreation.

(u) Subsidy Scheme for Needy Youth Members' Training

The Subsidy Scheme for Needy Youth Members' Training is represented by funds available for Scout members who have financial difficulties to participate in training courses or activities organised by the Association.

(v) Tai Tam Scout Centre Development Fund

The Tai Tam Scout Centre Development Fund is represented by funds available for development of the Tai Tam Scout Centre.

Replacement reserve

The Replacement reserve is to provide for future capital expenditure relating to B P International House. The provision for the current year is HK\$25,000,000 (2020: HK\$25,000,000) which has been approved by the Board of Management of B P International House. If capital expenditure from this reserve is capitalised as property, plant and equipment, an equal amount will be transferred out of this reserve into the Replacement amortisation reserve.

Replacement amortisation reserve

The Replacement amortisation reserve is represented by the net book value of property, plant and equipment funded by the Replacement reserve. Transfers from the Replacement reserve represent additions of HK\$40,066,000 (2020: HK\$3,182,000) during the year. Transfers to the Accumulated fund represent the corresponding depreciation charged for the year.

The gains or losses arising from the disposal of property, plant and equipment are credited/(charged) to the statement of income and expenditure. The net book value of the disposed assets is transferred from the Accumulated fund to the Replacement amortisation reserve.

Sinking fund

The Sinking fund is represented by funds provided for future redevelopment of the Hong Kong Scout Centre building of the Association. The provision for the current year is HK\$19,000,000 (2020: HK\$19,000,000).

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below:

Impairment of property, plant and equipment and right-of-use asset

Items of property, plant and equipment and right-of-use asset are tested for impairment if there is any indication that the carrying value of these assets may not be recoverable and the assets are subject to an impairment loss. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use. The value-in-use calculation requires the Association to estimate the future cash flows expected to arise from the relevant cash-generating unit and a suitable discount rate is used in order to calculate the present value.

If the prices of the respective equity investments had been 20% higher/lower, with all other variables held constant, the Association's investment evaluation reserve would have increased/decreased by approximately HK\$11,107,000 at 31 March 2021 (2020: HK\$2,399,000) as a result of the changes in the fair value of equity investments at fair value through other comprehensive income.

Credit risk
The Association's credit risk is primarily attributable to listed debt investments, cash and bank deposits and receivables. Management has a credit policy in place and the exposures to these credit risks are monitored on an ongoing basis.

Investments are normally only in liquid securities quoted on a recognized stock exchange and with counterparties that have high credit ratings.

Cash and bank deposits are placed with financial institutions with sound credit ratings to minimize credit exposure.

Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient liquid cash. Due to the nature of the underlying operations, the Association aims to maintain flexibility in funding by keeping sufficient cash and bank balances to fulfil its commitments and current working capital requirements.

The remaining contractual maturities at the end of the reporting period of the Association's financial liabilities are within one year or on demand.

In order to manage the above liquidity demands, at 31 March 2021, cash and cash equivalents amounting to HK\$40,763,000 (2020: HK\$699,432,000) is considered readily available.

Capital management
The primary objective of the Association's capital management is to safeguard the Association's ability to continue as a going concern in order to maintain an optimal capital structure.




